The quality production and enforcement of specifications as part of a set of contract documents has a profound impact on the evolution of the industry, not just the immediate project. Building owners, contractors, architects, manufacturer's representatives, and consulting engineers (and a few attorneys) all find their professions altered based on how specifications are enforced in the regions and industries where they are doing business. Many people involved in the built environment industry may not even be aware of the impacts of their actions or what they could do to turn the tide in their favor. Enjoy a facilitated discussion on what makes specification enforcement so valuable and the dangers, including those related to health and safety, if they are not enforced. Dig into the reasons why it's so challenging to produce and enforce a good set of specs and then look at opportunities for improvement. This presentation is not for the meek. This is an opportunity to confront our failures head-on and to leave knowing how to transform what we have done in the past.
